WE REMEMBER...

We have lost two Perendale Legends in our Ward in the past year.

When Perendales first started Graham Bryant was our first President and a real leader. **David Law** was a year younger and a respected breeder that everybody looked up to. Then **Kevin (KJ) Nesdale** came along a bit later. He was a year younger again and claimed to be the boy of the trio. Graham and David with the help of Sir Geoffrey Peren shaped KJ from a bush breeder to become one of the biggest and valued Perendale breeders of the Society.

Both David and KJ served on Council in the earlier days and both became Honorary Life members. David was like the David Fagan in the Shearing world, he won the Dunbarney Cup 17 times in succession at the Manawatu Show with up to 40 woolly rams to compete against. David was a great shower of sheep. I carted David's and K.J's sheep all over the North Island for a number of years with them winning more than their share of ribbons.

They promoted the breed and both David and KJ were very supported of the younger breeders. The three of us were also good on the social side of things being first into the refreshment tent and last out – those were the good days!

David had a great eye for stock. The Heights sheep were a type of their own, back in the day, like an Arab horse, good shoulder, length, long neck with head up high and survivors. David started Diana and I off with ten 5yr old stud ewes, and without his help and support we would not be where we are today. It is great that both Graham Bryant and David Law's studs are still in the Flock Book all these years later.

As for KJ, he started breeding Perendales in Ram Alley, probably the biggest number if Romney and Southdown studs in one road in the country. He enjoyed telling his neighbours they were a bit wool blind and he could help them see the light. KJ's rams stood the test of time. He had big clients for over 40 years and they topped the 2th Ewe Fair for most years at the Feilding sale against big numbers of vendors.

I have spent close to 60 years with these two old legends. David was my boss, my father at times, but always my mate. KJ was the old Irishman that I picked up at Cheltenham with his rams for four to five decades, and I never went home dehydrated after dropping him off.

They both will be missed by everyone – but never forgotten.

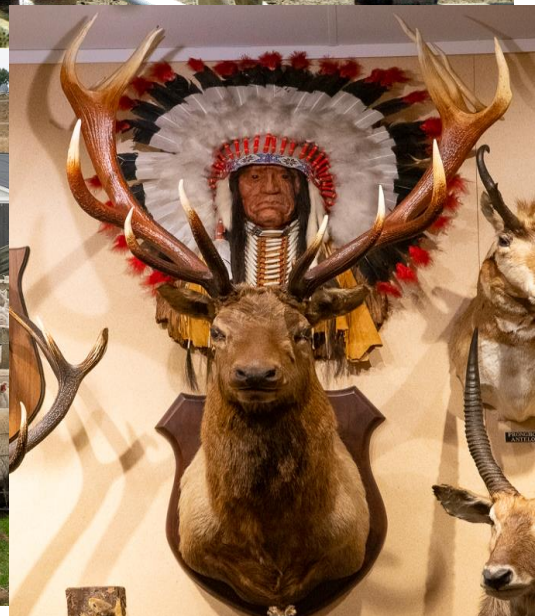
