2019.2020 PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT...

It gives me great pleasure to present my first annual report of the Perendale Society. It has been a year that has ended totally different to how anyone could have envisioned it twelve months ago.

The BLGNZ Next Generation Trial has had its final kill completed. This year was a difficult year for the trial with the extreme dry in the Hawkes Bay. This resulted in the Society purchasing the lambs as store lambs from Smedley Station and putting them on grazing. While this was not ideal it was the best option to enable us to collect more data on these lambs rather than just having them sold from under us as stores to a commercial farmer. I would like to thank Rob and Jen Evans and the Smedley team of staff and cadets for the time and effort they have put into the trial. Now is also the time to thank the team at Beef and Lamb Genetics and especially Annie O'Connell for the time and expertise that has gone into the trial. Annie has recently finished at BLG to take up another role in the New Zealand sheep genetics industry, so we wish her well for the future. On behalf of the Society I would also like to thank everyone for their involvement in the trial over the years, whether it be as a host farm, supplying sheep, technical or physical support. Without your help we would not have developed a low cost, robust trial that has been the envy of other breeds and became one of the stars in the BLG programme.

This year your Council decided to continue with Farmers Weekly with a smaller advertising lift out that was sent with the paper. We consider it value for money, giving us room for some stories along with the advertising, while still being able to use our map and Index to promote each breeder.

The North Island Ram Fair was held in Te Kuiti for the first time this year. I understand the move was successful with there being 54 sold, with an average price of \$1077 Top price went to John and Mary Spellman. The South Island Ram Fair was again held at Gore with rams sold being a few less than last year but the average remained similar - 31 sold, with average price \$2945 and top price going to Robert Gardyne. The St. Helens Stud was the winner of the Mervyn Ladbrook Trophy.

Instead of putting in show results for Canterbury and Hawkes Bay shows, I would like to just take the time to thank all the members who have a input into all the shows around NZ, whether it be helping organise, judging or showing the sheep. I know a huge effort goes in from a lot of people to make the shows be what they are, even if it is a small country show. For example, the Gore show would be classed as a small country show but had 425 sheep entries this year.

Conference last year was hosted by the Canterbury Ward. What an awesome time we had visiting Tim, Sue and Woody Andersons operation, NZ Merino in Christchurch, The Trans Alpine Train and the visits and sightseeing on the West Coast and the stunning bus trip back. Thanks to Annabelle and her team for organising a wonderful conference, we are the envy of many other breeds with our amazing conferences and camaraderie.

Christine, thank you ever so much for the work you do for the Society, South Island Ram Fair and the assistance you give us with running conference. You are always prepared, always have the answer and keep me on my toes. Thank you.

I would like to welcome Sean Brosnahan to the Council table representing Ward 2, whatever meeting form that will take over the next few months. Sean is from Ohope and first registered his stud in 2016.

A huge thanks to Graeme Maxwell for his time as Councillor and Sue for the time that she has spent helping in the background. I went and fished out the Perendale Story by Marjorie Law and found that Graeme joined Council in 1989, served as President from 2003-2007 - some 31 years in total on Council! This is an amazing contribution to the breed and was recognised with both Graeme and Sue receiving Life Membership in 2018. He is the only serving Councillor to work with two generations of the same family as President. You have now joined our team of "Old Heads" and I am sure your knowledge and wisdom will be called upon.

Finally, thank you to all our members for their continued support and I wish you all well going forward into the future, whatever shape that may take over the next 12 months or so.

Graeme Maxwell, Ward 2 Councillor for 31 years stepped down at the recent AGM.

Graeme Maxwell on the Perendale Society, and how Sue and I became Perendale Stud breeders...

When Sue and I came to Rangiora Trust in 1983 to manage for the Lo family the new owners. Included in the sheep they bought was an de registered Perendale Stud. We decided to reregister it after much correspondence with the late Ed Baxter.

Our good fortune was getting Adrian Waterworth as our inspector. He instilled wisdom in sheep selection to which we still refer to today. He also wanted to get off Council and encouraged me to stand. I was duly elected in 1989.

There were 11 Wards, now 6. 118 full members now 45. I think when I was appointed, I was the first and only farm manager to be appointed to Council.

We think of the Society as a huge extended family and have made lifelong friends within it. We have enjoyed being part of a great breed.

Before I join the backbenchers there are 4 things in my opinion breeders should think about

- 1. BVs are important but breeding a sheep that suits our clients is just as important.
- 2. Lamb Survival is more important than a high scanning percentage, we do not get paid for dead lambs.
- 3. F.E. Testing. It is something all breeders should think about doing. It got to North Canterbury this last year. Climate change is making itself felt.
- 4. FEC Testing with more and more drench resistance happening around the country and there may come a time when drenching affects our export.
